The Format: A thoughtful presentation will be shared, followed by two invited responders and then open group dialogue, to discern its resonance with vibrant Christian faith.

Presentation Synopsis: Greek philosopher Zeno of Elea argued that it is impossible to traverse a path of given distance because such a path is comprised of an infinite series of half-distances. Since performing an infinite number of tasks is impossible, the path cannot be traversed. Zeno’s paradox is an example of an ill-defined problem, founded on mixed dimensions. Trinitarian theology is similarly ill-defined and embroiled in a dimensional quagmire.



Speaker Biography: Sam Augsburger is a biomechanical engineer, serving as Director of the Motion Analysis Center at Shriners Hospitals for Children Medical Center in Lexington, Kentucky. Children with gait and other motion pathologies are assessed using 3D motion technology and provided with treatment recommendations. Sam has avocations in theology and physics and loves woodworking.
